



She is a popular workshop instructor and judge for national and international shows. Her works appear nationally and internationally and have been published in many *Splash* books and magazines. By balancing colors and weaving lights and darks, she will show how to achieve painterly and successful works.



Nestled deep in the San Juan Mountains, this mining-town-turned-skiing-mecca has a rich, colorful, and electric history filled with miners, cowboys, outlaws, ladies of the evening, and many more. The Telluride Historical Museums will guide this historic bar-hopping experience.

Traditional Southwest Ceramics Workshop with Terry Shepherd at Ghost Ranch, September 15 - 21

Travel with Terry Shepherd to the legendary and historic Ghost Ranch Education & Retreat Center in New Mexico to learn about native Southwest ceramic making. The ranch's 21,000 acres of towering rock walls, vivid colors, and vast dramatic sky scenery were made famous by painter Georgia O'Keeffe. Working with Ghost Ranch ceramics instructor and accomplished artist Barbara Campbell, Terry will lead participants on a ceramic journey into traditional Southwest ceramics-making. The workshop will focus on Pueblo ceramic-making technology in the Ancestral Puebloan tradition, including native clay exploration, coil and pinch technique, terra sigillata decorative slip, and pit firing.

Clay, leaf pressing, botanical sun prints: nature-based studies: flowers, plants, and landscapes; drawing, colored pencil studies; rock art; flips books; study of groups and art related the World Wildlife Federation, Oceana, and Nature Conservancy; community installation.

During the beginning of each class, Gayle will present a "mini-workshop" to build compositional skills and strengthen the "creative habit." Mixed media art journaling and drawing sessions will also be built into this dynamic class. Beginners and those who want a "refresher course" are welcome to join this class.





Fundamentals in Wheelthrowing

Mondays 6:30-9:30pm, March 11 – May 13, skipping March 25 Supplies required: basic pottery toolkit and a towel

This course is designed for both beginning and intermediate students. The projects and demonstrations will be geared toward the skill level and interest of each student. Throughout this course, students will learn techniques for wheel-throwing and glaze application, while forming a strong understanding of materials and firing practices associated with the medium. We will discuss in detail, during demonstrations and projects, the design principles for functional pottery, the fundamentals of form and form alteration, as well as aesthetic surface design techniques. Beginners will be encouraged to focus on bowls, cups, and mugs as a method for gaining comfortability with the materials. Intermediate students can continue to explore these basic forms or stretch their abilities with more complex forms and techniques. **Open Studio time** is available and strongly encouraged to practice skills learned in class. You can sign up for open studios via the Sign-Up Genius link you will receive before classes start.


